This is the moment in the season of Lent when the faith community is free to choose the readings from Year A for the next three Sundays if they are better suited for the elect on their way to Easter initiation. Commentaries on these readings may be found in other volumes of this publication.

The gospels for Year C have their own merit, although that for today may trigger mixed feelings. It juxtaposes Jesus' warning to the unrepentant with an image of divine patience. The selections for the following two Sundays – the parable of the father and two sons and the story of the woman accused of adultery – are both better-known and much loved.

This trio of readings expands on the brief word spoken when the ashes were imposed on Ash Wednesday: "Repent, and believe in the gospel." The two elements of this saying go hand in hand. Repentance has a positive goal, that of welcoming the good news. And the good news can only be welcomed if we repent of our self-absorption. Kept happily engaged with each other, repentance and faith promise to bear good fruit. **Source: Liturgy Brisbane**

WEEKLY REFLECTIONS
3RD SUNDAY OF LENT

Sometimes you hear Indigenous people refer to Jesus as a 'person of Country'. What might this mean? It is hard to imagine the Gospels without the connection of Jesus to the sea, the river, the desert, the fields and the mountain. His teaching often featured seeds and birds and sheep and corn. In today's Gospel, we hear the parable of the fig tree. The impatient person wants to cut it down. A wiser person is prepared to work with nature by putting manure on the tree and looking after it. This is a story of growth. God is creative. God is patient with us. God gives us another chance.

We have so much to learn from the depth and resilience of Australian Indigenous culture and spirituality, both of which are intimately linked to Country. This week, Project Compassion features the story of Janice, a Wagilak woman from the Northern Territory. Janice, who lives in a remote community, is part of the Djilpin Arts Aboriginal Corporation, supported by Caritas Australia. Janice is among those overcoming many obstacles to keeping their culture strong. She does this through dance. She honours the generations who have come before her and taught their community how to respect the land and live in harmony with it. Our response to Project Compassion is providing practical support for the blossoming of Indigenous culture for all future generations.

In today's reading, Moses is in the wilderness, a place of surprising possibilities. Like the Australian landscape, the wilderness in scripture is subtle; it is a place of encounter with God. Moses thinks he is having a regular day in the family business, looking after his father-in-law's sheep. But a voice comes from a bush that is blazing without being burnt up. The voice tells Moses to take off his shoes because 'the place on which you stand is holy ground.' This is the beginning of the freedom story of his people, the start of their journey out of captivity.



May our journey to the freedom God wants for us also begin with the realisation that we too are standing on Holy Ground. God calls us all to be people of Country.

Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord (25 March)

This feast originated in the East during the sixth century and gained universal observance in the West during the eighth century. It is a feast of the Lord, commemorating the announcement to the Virgin Mary of the Word made flesh, Mary's acceptance of God's will, and the conception of Christ nine months before Christmas. Its occurrence close to Easter links incarnation with the whole mystery of human redemption in Christ.

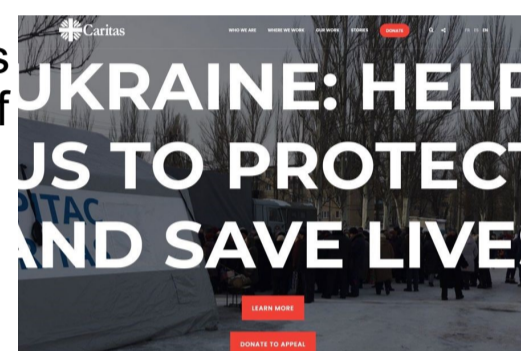
SUPPORT CARITAS UKRAINE APPEAL

Almsgiving is one of the traditional Lenten practices. One way to give to the less fortunate is to make blessing bags for the homeless. These care packages can be given to a local homeless shelter or outreach program to be distributed to their clients.

You can also keep blessing bags in your car. If you encounter a homeless person, you are ready to give them package of practical items which help them in their daily life and also send the message that we do care about them.

Items can be packaged in ziploc bags or drawstring bags. Which items are best for a blessing bag? Here are some suggestions for your care package:

Individually wrapped non perishable food items:

- granola bars
- breakfast bars
- peanut butter crackers
- packages of trail mix
- bottled water
- individual sized packages of mixed nuts
- protein bars
- hard candy
- mints
- dried fruits

Hygiene and personal care items:

- hand lotion
- lip balm
- toothpaste
- toothbrush
- comb
- hand sanitizer
- towelettes
- sunscreen
- insect repellent
- deodorant
- razor
- bandaids

It is also nice to include a note of encouragement, to let the recipient know that they are valued. A scripture verse is appropriate, but so is a drawing. Another suggestion is to include a list of local support services, soup kitchens, and shelters.



WORLD MEETING OF FAMILIES

The 2022 World Meeting of Families will be marked in the Archdiocese of Sydney with a local diocesan celebration. This local gathering will take place from Friday 24 June to Sunday 26 June. Initiatives will include a local parish celebration, an opportunity for families to make pilgrimages to sacred locations within the Archdiocese, and will culminate with a Mass celebrated by Archbishop Anthony Fisher OP with an associated Sunday afternoon 'Festival of Families'.
