Reading John's gospel can be both inspiring and frustrating. It's inspiring when it reveals and draws us into the intimacy shared by Father and Son. "No one has ever seen God," John wrote, "it is the only Son, who is nearest to the Father's heart, who has made him known" (1:18). It's sometimes frustrating when it engages us at a human level then disconcertingly takes us into deep waters.



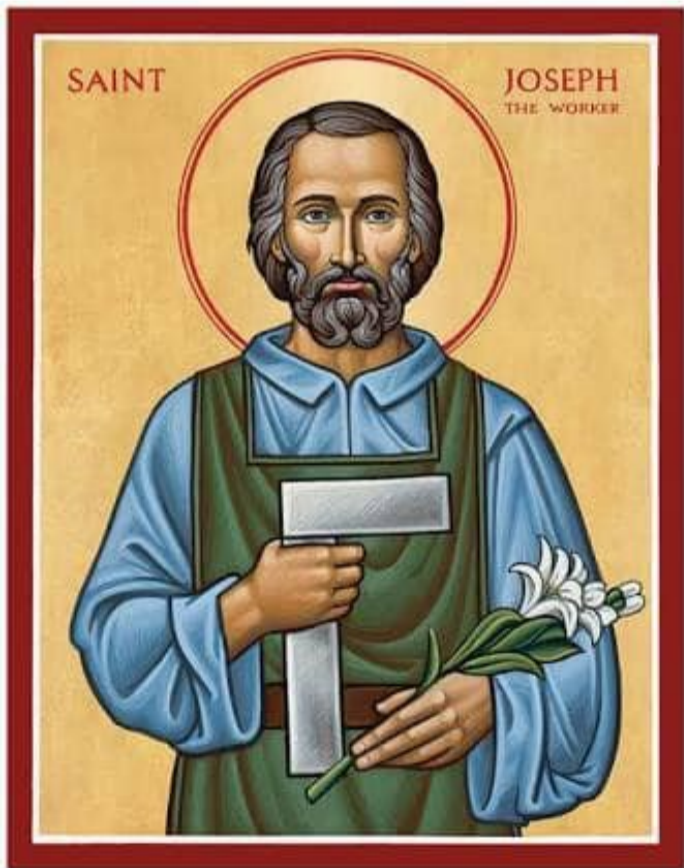
Today's gospel tells us how the risen Lord appeared to his disciples in Galilee. We are curious. We want to know more. Why have they gone back to Lake Tiberias? Have they abandoned all their hopes? Are they there in obedience to a command of Jesus? What made "the disciple Jesus loved" recognise him as "the Lord"? Why are we told there were 153 fish? These are just some of the many questions that this story raises but does not answer.

John would have us let go of our need for "facts" in favour of grasping a deeper truth. He's inviting us to share in the disciples' apparent hesitation and uncertainty, to be disconcerted by experiences that we neither control nor understand, to be led as Thomas was into a deeper faith. In particular, as we contemplate the scene by the lakeside, with the risen Jesus feeding his disciples bread and fish from the charcoal fire, we might reflect on the eucharistic meal for which we are gathered. Can our eyes be opened to see the divine presence revealed in the assembly, the ministers, the word and the eucharistic gifts? Can we give wholehearted assent to our mission in the world?

In other years: St Joseph the Worker

The feast of Saint Joseph the Worker is not a mere Catholic copying of the Communist First of May – any more than Christmas is a mere copy of the pagan feast of Saturnalia. The dates are taken over, for obvious reasons; but the content is radically different.



The Christian view of work is the opposite of the materialist view. A worker such as St Joseph is not a mere lump of labour – "1.00 human work units." He is a person. He is created in God's own image, and just as creation is an activity of God, so creation is an activity of the worker. The work we do echoes the glorious work that God has done. It may not be wasted; or abused; or improperly paid; or directed to wrong or pointless ends. To do any of these things is not oppression, it is sacrilege. The glory of the present economic system is when it gives so many, of whatever class, the chance to build and create something worthwhile, whether from their own resources, or in collaboration with others, or by attracting investment from others. But its shame is when that does not happen: when people are coerced, by greed or by poverty, into being "lumps of labour." Whether the labour is arduous or not makes no difference; whether it is richly paid or not makes no difference.

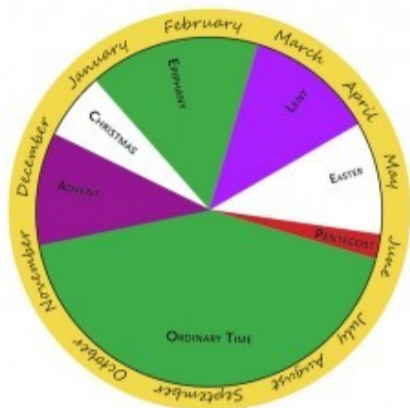
Because she must combat the anti-humanist Communist heresy the Church is sometimes thought to be on the side of capital. Reading the successive Papal encyclicals on labour and society, from *Rerum Novarum* (1891) onwards, will soon dispel that illusion. The enemies of the Church have no reason to read them; all too often we feel too comfortable in our present economic state and refrain from reading them also.

The simple step of a courageous individual is not to take part in the lie. One word of truth outweighs the world.

LITURGICAL COLOUR: WHITE

White is the colour of heaven. Liturgically, it is used to celebrate feasts of the Lord; Christmas and Easter, the great seasons of the Lord; and the saints. Not that you will always see white in church, because if something more splendid, such as gold, is available, that can and should be used instead. We are, after all, celebrating.



In the earliest centuries all vestments were white – the white of baptismal purity and of the robes worn by the armies of the redeemed in the Apocalypse, washed white in the blood of the Lamb. As the Church grew secure enough to be able to plan her liturgy, she began to use colour so that our sense of sight could deepen our experience of the mysteries of salvation, just as incense recruits our sense of smell and music that of hearing. Over the centuries various schemes of colour for feasts and seasons were worked out, and it is only as late as the 19th century that they were harmonized into their present form.

2 May **Saint Athanasius** (Born in 295. Buried on this day in 373 at Alexandria [Egypt]. Attended the first ecumenical council of Nicaea as a deacon. Later, as bishop of Alexandria, he upheld that Council's doctrine in the efface of great opposition from Arians, including several emperors. Sent into exile a number of times. Venerated as the "Father of Orthodoxy" for championing the true and equal divinity of the incarnate Son of God. **Source: Liturgy Brisbane**

3 May **Saint Philip and James**



(Philip, from Bethsaida in Galilee, became a disciple of Jesus and one of the twelve. Recorded in the Fourth Gospel as recognising in Jesus the one foretold by Moses and the prophets [John 1:45] and as introducing Gentiles to the Lord [John 12:20- 22]. According to Acts 8:5, he was the first to preach the gospel to non-Jews. James, son of Alphaeus, was also one of the twelve called by Jesus (Mark 3:18ff). Known as James the Less. Venerated traditionally as the author of the letter of James and as leader of the Church in Jerusalem, where he died in the year 62. The joint feast of Philip and James has been celebrated in Rome since at least the sixth century).

10 May **Mother's Day**

(Many Australians follow the Mother's Day traditions that stem from observances in countries such as the United States and the United Kingdom. The Mother's Day date in Australia is the same as the date observed in the United States, which is the second Sunday of May each year. However, it is an Australian who is credited with having started the tradition of giving gifts on Mother's Day: Janet Heyden, a resident of Leichhardt Sydney, started a campaign in 1924 to collect gifts for lonely aged mothers.
